Comparison of India with South Asian countries on the progress on policy and programmes related to breastfeeding and infant and young child feeding

If India were to invest in this area, India can expect to improve its situation and rank among the 7 South Asian countries. Table below reflects on the 10 policies and programmes related to breastfeeding and infant and young child feeding and compares with other countries. This is based on assessment reports conducted by the World Breastfeeding Trends Initiative (WBT*i*). Sri Lanka scores the highest 91/100, and India a mere 45. Bangladesh is at 86, Afghanistan at 80, Maldives at 69.5, and Bhutan & Nepal at 55. All countries score higher than India. Sri Lanka, one can see scoring maximum "Green" among ten areas, and maintains a high rate of exclusive breastfeeding. India could learn from Sri Lanka how they did it. According to WBT*i*, India has not made much progress; scored 45 in 2005 and remains at 45. Whereas other countries have; for example Afghanistan scored 27 in 2005 and now at 80. Sri Lanka scored 72 in 2005 and now is 91.
